Introduction

Offaly Traveller Movement has developed from Tullamore Traveller Movement Ltd, a community development organisation response to the needs of Travellers in Tullamore and its environs. Established in 1991 TTM was launched in 1996 and we have since evolved into Offaly Traveller Movement (OTM). We continue to work for Traveller rights and social justice in partnership with the wider community throughout Offaly. We are an ever expanding non profit organisation with dedicated staff members offering programmes responding to various needs such as health and men's health, mental health, accommodation, youth, education, and human rights.

Vision

The vision of Offaly Traveller Movement is for full equality and social justice for Travellers in County Offaly.

Mission

The mission of OTM is to empower Travellers, and to work as a partnership between Travellers and settled people to achieve equality and social justice for Travellers in County Offaly.

Principles

The principles that underpin the work of Offaly Traveller Movement focus on equality and social justice. We are deeply committed to human rights using a community development approach. This encompasses empowerment, participation, partnership and challenging discrimination.

Strategic Plan

Following an extensive, facilitated whole-team reflective exercise and two strategic planning meetings in 2015, it became apparent that the priorities emerging from the 2012 community consultation remain as valid and applicable to Travellers presently as they were three years ago, with many indicators that they are even more acutely pertinent now, given the continued deterioration in funding and socio-economic conditions. As such, it was considered inappropriate and unnecessary to undertake a further consultation process with members of the Traveller community in Co Offaly, but instead retain the strategic priorities as the basis of the present Strategic Plan (2015 – 2020), albeit with adjustments to reflect the ongoing development of the service.

The following areas form the basis of both the previous and current Strategic Plan, a number of OTM studies are used as well as policy statements relating to Traveller health & wellbeing.

Key areas of work

- Cultural and ethnic identity
- Health and Mental Health
- Accommodation
- Education & youth
- Enterprise and work

Accommodation

Strategic Priority 1.1: To Achieve Culturally Appropriate Accommodation for Travellers in County Offaly

Offaly Traveller Movement employ two part time accommodation workers who continued to work with a high volume of referrals for support regarding various housing issues in 2018. The team liaised with relevant statutory and voluntary bodies and provided support and advice to Traveller individuals and families. The OTM Accommodation team recognised the existence of a significant gap between Traveller accommodation needs and the available supply of both Traveller specific and mainstream accommodation. In 2018 over 2,700 interventions were recorded.

Throughout 2018 Offaly Traveller Movement continued to respond to the ongoing accommodation crisis throughout Offaly. An unprecedented number of Traveller families were living in overcrowded situations, on the side of the road, in unofficial halting sites, emergency accommodation and B&B's. For many families there was no access to basic amenities such as running water and electricity or toilet facilities. Young Traveller children who were attending school in the local areas had to move resulting in a disruption to their school attendance. There had been an increase in the number of evictions due to 'illegal encampments'. Living in these conditions greatly reduces the life expectancy of the Traveller community, which is now comparable to that of the settled community in the 1950's. Studies have shown that there is a critical link between improved accommodation for Travellers and better uptake of education, health and employment services.

In September 2018 the accommodation team conducted a count and recorded 127 Travellers living with no services in Offaly, 56 adults and 71 children. OTM continued to advocate and represent Travellers at local, county, regional and national level in 2018 however the lack of appropriate accommodation continues to be one of OTM's most challenging areas of work.

Homelessness in Offaly – It's closer than we think

OTM invited local church leaders and activists to come together to highlight the accommodation and homeless crisis in Offaly. On March 20th 2018 a public discussion was organised by this group of concerned citizens from the Tullamore area among whom were members of OTM, clerical members of the Anglican, Catholic, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in Tullamore, and local activists. The organising committees aim was to create awareness of the seriousness of the issue of rural homelessness in Offaly in general, but also to give courage to the public representatives and their constituents, to do what is legally responsible and morally right in relation to the accommodation issues for Travellers.

The public discussion was chaired by Vincent Browne and had a number of panel speakers including; Pat Doyle - National CEO of the Peter McVerry Trust, Dr. Oonagh McArdle- Lecturer at Department of Applied Social Studies Maynooth University, Dr. Brigid Quilligan Former Director of the Irish Traveller Movement and well known and respected Traveller activist, Tony O'Riordan – CEO of Midlands Simon Community and Tom Shanahan, Director of Housing at Offaly County Council. The event was a joint project between the 4 churches in Offaly with community groups and supported by the Offaly County Council. Over 300 people attended this interactive event that is work in progress. It is hoped that similar discussions will take place in the future.

Accommodation

Strategic Priority 1.1: To Achieve Culturally Appropriate Accommodation for Travellers in County Offaly

Traveller Accommodation Programme

Under the 1998 Traveller Accommodation Act, local authorities are mandated to draw up five-year Traveller Accommodation Programmes (TAP) to assess local Traveller accommodation needs in their area, set targets and deliver them.

Offaly Traveller Movement made a submission to Offaly County Council in October 2018 for inclusion in the local TAP Programme 2019 -2024 and once again reiterated and highlighted the ever increasing need for Traveller specific accommodation to include Halting Sites, Group Housing and Standard Housing units. Unfortunately Traveller accommodation targets have not been met at any point since they were made mandatory on local authorities.

The work of the OTM accommodation team is ongoing and we endeavour to continue to advocate for change in policy and within a consultation process with the Local Authority highlight the inadequacies of culturally appropriate accommodation and the need to meet realistic, need based targets.

Minister Doherty Visits Tullamore

In July 2018 Regina Doherty, Minister for Employment Affairs & Social Protection visited OTM. She was appalled to hear that there was 105 people, 46 adults and 59 children living without running water, electricity, toilets, bin collection or any facilities and only around 30 families living in serviced halting sites in Offaly. She visited Traveller families in their own space and saw first-hand what the conditions were like on the ground. She spoke with women and children living in the unofficial site, Kilcruttin, Tullamore and met some of the children who are growing up in very challenging circumstances. Minister Doherty learned that many of the official site residents have extended families who have nowhere to stay. The bays on the official site were built over 25 years ago but there was no succession planning and no provision for halting sites for families as they grow and go on to have children of their own. During her visit Minister Doherty was very empathetic, she expressed grave concern and was very aware of the basic human rights issues at the heart of these families living arrangements. A member of staff at OTM said it was 'brilliant to have Regina Doherty visit, she was a breath of fresh air, sat down on the grass to talk to the children which is a great indication that she was genuinely interested in what Travellers on the ground have to say'.

Strategic Priority 2.1: To Increase Life Expectancy for Travellers in County Offaly

The Traveller Primary Health Care programme (PHCP) is a partnership between OTM and the HSE and employs 11 part-time staff members. This comprises of 7 Traveller peer Community Health Workers (CHWs), 1 Men's Health Worker, 1 Community Development Worker, 1 Public Health Nurse and 1 Health Manager. The PHCP is in existence in Tullamore for 20 years. It began in 1999 with a comprehensive training period and has been fully operational since 2003. The programme is a community development and health promotion initiative which delivers health and wellbeing information to Travellers in Offaly.

The CHWs regularly visit local Traveller families and this work is essential to the success of the PHCP. Throughout the year the CHWs delivered health care information on a wide range of subjects including: nutrition, healthy heart, asthma, child safety, dental care, diabetes, cancer prevention, substance misuse, mental health and suicide prevention. In 2018 the CHWs provided outreach visits to over 900 Travellers in Offaly. During the year the CHWs also took part in computer training, GDPR data protection training, the new Children First E-Learning programme, Minding your Mental Health & Wellbeing training, Jigsaw Youth Mental Health training, Disability Awareness training as well as Women's Aid training on Best Practice in Woman and Child Protection in the context of domestic violence. They attended the Traveller Ethnicity Celebrations at the Royal Hospital Kilmainham, Irish Traveller Movement AGM and Conference in Galway, the Traveller Women's Forum AGM in Tullamore and a staff development educational trip to Kilmainham Jail and to Hugh Lane Art gallery.

The CHWs continued to work on fire safety prevention and awareness. They were actively engaged in supporting the work of the Mental Health Social Worker and the Public Health Nurse.

Strategic Priority 2.1: To Increase Life Expectancy for Travellers in County Offaly

Primary Health Care Project

In 2018 the CHW's delivered workshops alongside the Public Health Nurse in Tullamore and in Birr on dental health and managing asthma and diabetes. They worked with the Mental Health Social Worker to organise a wellness day where clients of OTM were invited to avail of massage and other de-stressing therapies.

Also in 2018, the CHWs delivered Cultural Awareness Training in Athlone Institute of Technology, Maynooth University and to students visiting from North Dakota University. They took part in the Raise the Roof, Traveller Homes Matter protest in Dublin.

The CHWs also hosted a visit from Regina Doherty, Minister for Employment Affairs and Social Protection and accompanied her on visits to official and unofficial sites in Tullamore. They worked with the men's health worker to organise a pilgrimage to Croagh Patrick and an outing to Cong and Ashford Castle for older Travellers. They also helped to organise and took part in the St. Patricks day parade, the Traveller Pride Family Day at Charleville Castle and organised Christmas wreath making classes in Banagher and Tullamore.

Traveller Men's Health

In 2018 Frank our Men's Health Worker focused on increasing the numbers of Traveller men engaging with OTM's Men's Health Project. Frank engaged Traveller men in interventions which initiated dialogue and raised awareness around mental health and suicide. Frank's work focused on highlighting and challenging the key inequalities in Traveller men's health. Throughout 2018, he worked closely with four groups of Traveller men and recorded close to 500 interventions in both mental and physical health and wellbeing. The key inequalities in Traveller men's health, and the overall aim of his work was to improve health outcomes for Traveller men. Through group work he encouraged men from Tullamore and Birr to engage in SafeTalk, and Taking Control Workshops.

A total of 34 men from Birr and Tullamore participated in these programmes. Frank accompanied the men on social outings to Croagh Patrick, and organised handball tournaments to encourage the men to take care of their overall health and wellbeing through exercise and sport. Frank also organised the Men's Health Network across the four counties, Offaly, Laois, Westmeath and Longford. This space brings men together to discuss issues affecting them in their local areas and to share ideas and supports available. Frank and Emma OTM's Managing Director also presented the findings from the 2017 Horse Project Review at the World Community Development Conference at Maynooth University in June 2018.

The impact of the Men's Health Programme in Offaly:

- ⇒ Improving engagement of Traveller men with existing health services & Facilitating health checks
- ⇒ Developing and facilitating sports and leisure opportunities for Traveller men
- ⇒ Improving awareness of mental health issues and supports available
- ⇒ Encouraging dialogue and raising awareness of suicide prevention and intervention
- ⇒ Establishing and participating in the Traveller Men's Health Network
- ⇒ Addressing the isolation experienced by older Traveller men & engaging men in the OTM Horse Project

Horse Project

Lesley works part time on OTM's Horse Project. Travellers in Offaly have a long and rich history of keeping horses. The programme targets Traveller men who have an interest and passion for horses but who are otherwise disengaged with health services. The focus of the Horse Project in 2018 was intergenerational work and on projects that fostered father and son interactions and knowledge sharing. The overall aim is to provide a culturally responsive method of improving health outcomes for Traveller men.

The impact of the Horse Project in Offaly:

- ⇒ Increased engagement of Traveller men in relation to the social determinants of their health
- ⇒ Increased awareness of and access to existing health services and health professionals in Offaly
- ⇒ Increased access to and interaction with the OTM's Men's Health Programmes, Primary Healthcare Team and other specialist services
- ⇒ Capacity building and leadership roles for Traveller men
- ⇒ Improvement of men's physical and mental health through the interaction with the horse.

Minister Stanton's Visit to OTM

Minister of State for Equality, Immigration & Integration, David Stanton visited OTM in November 2018, and met with the Men's health worker, Traveller men of the Horse Project, as well as other staff and local councillors. The men highlighted the positive aspects of Traveller horse culture and took the opportunity to discuss the issue of legislation and the negative impact that this has on their culture. The Minister, accompanied by OTM staff members went out on site to visit 2 horse men and their horses and Minister Stanton got to see the Horse Project in action. The Traveller horse men also told the Minister how important horses are to them and how difficult it has become to keep this tradition strong and to pass it on to the next generation.

The Public Health Nurse at OTM

The public health nursing (PHN) role in partnership with Offaly Traveller Movement has many diverse components to it. The overall aim is always to be culturally competent, work alongside people to empower them and provide a positive experience. Nuala Hogan works as a PHN in the Primary Health Care Programme (PHCP) which serves the Traveller community in County Offaly. The importance of having a PHN working in Traveller health is essential to build trust and improve health outcomes. The need for Traveller specific programmes was outlined in the All Ireland Traveller Health Status Study (2007-2010). The strategy identifies a number of obstacles to accessing health services and the importance of PHCPs. As a PHN working in partnership with the Traveller organisations. Nuala is responsible for planning Traveller specific health programmes with the peer women in a culturally sensitive manner that meets the health needs of the wider Traveller communities. Some of the programmes she planned and delivered with the Peers in 2018 include: child safety awareness, cervical screening, breast screening, diabetes, retinal screening, asthma and immunisations.

Nuala receives referrals from all members of the health care team at OTM and other allied health care professionals within the HSE and visits clients with the wider OTM team. The six C's of care, compassion, competence, communication, courage and commitment are at the heart of her role with the aim being to maximise health and wellbeing. She describes her role to Traveller clients as "The Well Being Nurse." as this takes away any medical jargon or barriers. Nuala's role covers four main areas: therapeutic activities, liaison interventions, educative interventions, and follow-up interventions


An inter-professional model of good practice is in place at OTM with the nursing / social model of care being set up over six year ago when Sandra McDonagh joined OTM as the mental health social worker. Nuala and Sandra do home visits and this decision is made on the basis of a referral. They provide family support, preventative and practical interventions, health promotion and guidance for clients. They complete holistic nursing and social assessments that are linked to poor accommodation, poor access to health, social care and for clients in crisis. The aim of this work is to make every contact count and support the health and wellbeing of the wider Traveller community. Nuala sat on the working group with members of OTM and other agencies to create "A Guide to Developing a Local Co-Ordinated Crisis Response Plan for the Traveller Community" that was launched in 2018. and was also nominated as a member of the core team for the Suicide Response Plan.

Nuala delivered cultural awareness training to American students from North Dakota along with other members of the team at OTM. Nuala also sits on the Board of Management at Parents First in Tullamore, Co. Offaly and liaises with other agencies such as Triple P Parenting Programme, TUSLA, Barnardos and nursing colleagues in the HSE.

Nuala manages and leads out on Nurse Led Health Screening Clinics for both Traveller men and women and this uses the social model of healthcare screening effectively and is Traveller specific. It allows clients to develop awareness around the need for and the benefits of routine healthcare screening in their lives. This involves screening healthy people in order to record symptoms of potential conditions which if caught in the early phase can be effectively and successfully treated. Two of the main elements that help ensure success here is trust and professionalism

Mental Health

Strategic Priority 2.2: To improve Traveller Mental Health and Wellbeing

Travelling to Wellbeing

Travelling to Wellbeing continues to offer a dedicated culturally appropriate, clinical, therapeutic, recovery focused mental health service for Travellers in Offaly. This service is provided by way of individual and group support, family support, crisis intervention, mental health recovery programs, advocacy and referral pathways to other services for Travellers throughout the County. Travelling to Wellbeing continues to work in partnership and co-production with a range of services, promoting and developing mental health training and local community mental health initiatives, while utilizing the departments in OTM, Men's Health, Accommodation, Community Development and Primary Healthcare to address the needs of Travellers who engage with the service.

2018 again saw an increase in Travellers engaging with the one to one support service. 128 service users accessed the service, 69 female, 42 male and 18 family support.. Community and partnership work were also prioritised this year. The weekly peer support group, Mincéars Táirien, continued in Birr and Tullamore and in each of these groups a combination of mental health, physical health, suicide awareness educational supports and wellbeing activities were offered.


Travelling to Wellbeing, in partnership with a range of local organisations, organised and supported a varied programme of talks and activities to promote a positive understanding of mental health and reduce the stigma associated with it. These included See Change and the Green Ribbon Campaign, Shine's one day 'Taking Control' Workshop, a Mental Health and Wellbeing Pilgrimage and events to mark World Suicide Prevention Day and World Mental Health Day. There was over 2000 interventions recorded in 2018.

Offaly Travellers have been represented by Travelling to Wellbeing at the Irish Association of Social Workers Annual Conference, National Traveller Mental Health Network, Concerned Citizens Steering Group, National Travellers Women's Forum, Consultations with the Department of Health and the Local Traveller Accommodation Consultative Committee.

Research

A Guide to Developing a Local Co-Ordinated Crisis Response Plan for Travellers was developed and launched in 2018. This Guide provides a framework for developing a Local Co-Ordinated Crisis Response Plan for the Traveller Community in partnership with relevant organisations and services, which is activated for 4-6 weeks following the occurrence of an attempted suicide, suicide or unexpected death. This is now listed as an action in Connecting for Life 2018-2020 Midlands, Louth and Meath.


Offaly Traveller Counselling Service

It is well documented that Travellers in Ireland experience poorer mental health and are at higher risk of suicide than their settled counterparts, suicide rates for Travellers are currently 7 times higher than the settled population. Offaly Traveller Movement in recognising these alarming statistics and the gaps in service provision secured funding to pilot a local Traveller specific counselling/systemic psychotherapy service for Travellers in Offaly. This unique service operated within a community development organisation that has built up trust and relationships for over 20 years with the Traveller community throughout Offaly, many of whom are very difficult to reach and the most vulnerable people in Irish society today.

In 2018 following the success of this pilot project Offaly Traveller Movement in partnership with the National Traveller Counselling Service set up the Offaly Traveller Counselling Service. Currently operating on limited funding this culturally specific counselling/psychotherapy family support service is available to individuals and families of all ages three hours per week on a bi-weekly basis in Tullamore and Birr.

In 2018 a total of 42 therapy sessions were availed of, with 32 individual, 8 couple and 2 families engaging with the service. This included 31 female and 22 male of various ages in Offaly. This service is in the initial stages of development and Offaly Traveller Movement are working to ensure it becomes an established part of the services available to Travellers locally.

Summary of Presenting Issues



Youth & Education

Strategic Priority 4: To Support Traveller Youth and Education

OTM Youth Project

Offaly Traveller Movement Youth Project provides young Travellers with informal, social and educational support and a platform for youth development. We provide Traveller youth with a forum for peer supported activities, through drop in clubs, programmes, and a safe space for young Travellers, from the ages of 10 and over. OTM weekly drop in focuses on imperative peer support and exploration of Traveller identity as young people. It provides opportunities to explore issues and talk, confide, seek support or referral to other services where required. This is a culturally responsive, youth work focused social space with different activities every week. In 2018, OTM Youth recorded a total of 890 interventions with 91 young people. Throughout 2018, we facilitated a range of programmes and activities which included Fitness classes, nail and beauty for young females in the youth project, swimming lessons for young people in Birr, arts and crafts projects, drama, film and team development activities. Some highlights of the year included:

Spring 2018: Youth participated in celebrations such as St Patrick's Day Parade and were actively involved in arts and crafts making for the float. Participated in focus groups for research from the Youth Arts Council highlighting the need for Traveller representation in national youth arts strategies. Team building day, zip lining at Lough Key Forest Park Adventure Centre with team activities on the zip line circuits

Summer 2018: Some young people participated in the Darkness into Light walk for Pieta House with us in May. Sports day for Traveller Pride Family Fun day in June including relay races, junior quoits throwing and tug of war. Young people attended and participated in the National Social Inclusion Forum 2018 in the Aviva Stadium. OTM Youth Summer Project in July which included group development and leadership activities, with trips to Funtasia water park in Drogheda, trampolining at Jump




